Chairman's Report

If there is one thing that I intend to achieve as current Chairman, it is to improve the interaction between the Parish Council and residents of Catcliffe.

I often hear stories of how community spirited our village once was, something that we still see, but certainly not enough. I am proud to live in Catcliffe, and feel that we can return to the days when everyone knew their neighbours names and stopped to speak to each other. The key is to talk and listen. The Parish Council is here to serve the community but we can't achieve that without residents telling us what they want. Contact details for all your Councillors are on the last page so please contact them, not simply to report litter or dog fouling, but to let them know what you would like to see to improve Catcliffe.

Many areas are exclusively the responsibility of the Borough Council so please see the Useful Contacts section on the back page which gives details of who you can report problems to directly.

The Parish Council is responsible for local recreational facilities and land under the Council's ownership. However we can't work miracles, and exist on a very small income. The Borough Council are burdening us with more responsibility year on year, as they seek to address their budget cuts, so the money that we have available has to go even further. This doesn't mean that we have to accept things getting worse, we just need to change our approach. For example we now have to fund grass cutting of the land under our control. As a result the allotments have been leased to a community association,

as has the bowling green, to ensure they remain an important Council owned asset, but at a reduced cost.

The Councils current primary issue is the long term future of the Memorial Hall. This facility is no longer fit for purpose, and needs major work if it is to continue to serve the community in the future. We are adamant this facility should not be lost. However difficult decisions have to be made to preserve and enhance the building. Replacing the building with a new facility appears to be too expensive as does a total renovation of the entire building.

The Councils preferred option is to renovate the main part of the hall, together with the existing meeting room, whilst demolishing the unused parts. However as this is your facility a public consultation will be undertaken. Please see the Hall article herein and provide your comments. The building could provide for a multitude of events or facilities. The key is to know what you want. Don't think that your opinion is not valuable, or indeed unwanted, start to engage with myself and others and together we can turn our village back into the thriving, friendly community it once was.

We also desperately need people to come forward so we can achieve more. We have already been involved with community led litter picks, the graveyard clear up and the Big Lunch event, and do you want to know a secret, it also feels pretty good to put something back into the community, just ask one of those people in the village who have made the effort already!

During the short time the group have been in existence they have become members of RotherFed and have forged links with other organisations such as Voluntary Action Rotherham. They have also had support from the Parish Council and the local Borough Councillors.

The group is represented on the Rother Valley West Area Assembly, the Rother Valley West Housing Panel and the Brinsworth & Catcliffe Learning Community. In addition the Chairman is a RotherFed Digital Champion and member of the Rotherham Digital Inclusion Network which gives access to a vast source of technology and expertise. The Secretary is on the management

committee of the Meadows Sure Start Centre.

Many people have contacted Friends of Catcliffe with suggestions of projects they could take on. The group are delighted by this and want to make a difference. However the group are also keen to recruit volunteers to help deliver projects. By example, the two Waste Skip days could have been better supported.

In contrast volunteers helped make The Big Lunch event at the Memorial Hall (which they hope to repeat) a lovely day and the Graveyard clean-up a tremendous success. These achievements illustrate what can be achieved if residents work together.

There are a couple of further plans

in the pipeline which the group hope to deliver in partnership with other organisations in the village. However they do need the people of Catcliffe to muck in. Catcliffe Memorial Hall – Have your say

As Custodian Trustee of the Memorial Hall, the Parish Council recently obtained an Options Appraisal Report to enable members to consider the options available to retain this facility for the parish.

Without renovation to a modern standard the facility would need to close. Members are aware that there are no cheap options. The recently agreed preferred option is to keep the original building but demolish part of the hall and the two storey extension, which is in a very poor state of repair and currently unused. By reducing the size of the facility it is hoped that the remaining structure can be brought up to a higher standard and ongoing maintenance costs can be reduced. Significant funding in the region of £250,000 will still be required to undertake the work.

In light of the costs and the impact the facility has on the community, the Parish Council wants your views before any final decision is taken.
