Memorial Hall Refurbishment Interior

Many of you will have already visited the refurbished Memorial Hall for one reason, or another. It may have been a function, one of our many organised sessions, or whilst voting, but I am sure you will agree, that it is a much more welcoming place, post renovation. With up to date, heating, LED lighting and modern amenities, we have brought the village's main asset back from the brink.

When planning started, many years ago, we began the long and difficult process of upgrading what was once a wonderful facility. But a combination of neglect (mainly due to lack of funds) and a reluctance to take on such a mammoth task, saw the hall slowly, but surely, become unfit for the purpose it was intended. It had been many, many years since any meaningful investment, and it was beginning to show. The catalyst was the fact that we were suffering major roof leaks, in the main hall, together with ongoing plumbing problems in the toilet sections. Also, the degradation of the extension, behind the stage, mainly due to a burst water tank, devastating a number of rooms within that section of the building, meant that the majority of the building was no longer fit for purpose.

In total, years of work have gone into the building you see now, from the initial planning, to loan applications, architectural drawings, and finally, once everything else was in place, the tender process, where we had to decide upon who would actually do the work. The six-months from November 2016, to April 2017, when our chosen contractors undertook the renovation, was only a small part of the overall process - and it was, in fact, begun only just in time. When it came to the demolition of the extension, the problem was not taking it down, but stopping it from falling down! The roof interior, once fully exposed, was also found to be in far worse condition than anyone could imagine. In reality, if we had waited any longer, the building may have been beyond saving. Thanks should go to all the people in the background, mainly Councillors, who gave up a lot of their time and effort, for no reward, other than to safeguard the future of the Parish Councils main asset.

The hall is already proving to be a big hit, with more bookings than we've had in years, and classes or groups meeting every day of the week. Although not yet fully finished, (we are improving things all the time by investing in new fixtures and fittings when we can), the hall is well on the way to being self-sufficient, something which it has not been for many years - which should ultimately free up funds for us to use in other parts of the community.

Friends of Catcliffe

About 3 years ago Pete Wragg announced to the Coffee Pot his granddaughter had suggested we put a nativity scene in our historic Glass Kiln and illuminate it. Various suggestions such as 'take more water with it' were made and we carried on with the chat and coffee. Undeterred he came a few weeks later to inform us his mate had offered to

make the figures. So started a process that involved various organisations. It wasn't easy, projects on this scale don't just happen, we experienced obstacles at every step but the main team of Pete DeVeaux, Glenys Cooper, Andy Cater, Pete Wragg, Alan Register and Gerry Screation stuck at it. We had great assistance from other church members and our friends and colleagues. Friends of Catcliffe provided the lights and an electric source. Ward Councillors and the Parish Council were keen to help and provided the necessary finances. Christine Evans from Rotherham Heritage was delighted to come on board, it is they who 'own' and manage the kiln, and everything was put in place. And the church, in the form of Reverends Helen and David Bent, offered to lead an evening of community carols at the kiln to involve the whole village.

For the first year, the general feeling was that we'd consider it would be worthwhile if we attracted a dozen or so villagers. Well we got that wrong by some distance, didn't we? We estimated at least 80 folks turned up to join in the carols and the social at the church afterwards. The comments were fabulous and we couldn't help but feel well satisfied. Which meant only one thing; we'd have to do it again.

We decided the use of a generator wasn't acceptable but discussions about providing an electric supply proved fruitless. Not to be put off, the church bought new figures and Friends of Catcliffe bought new battery powered lights. Then the words, Risk Assessment, Health and Safety put a massive dent in our plans. This was because we were on council owned land and we suddenly needed more licences than there are televisions in the village. Or so it seemed. Luckily Neighbourhood Services joined us in the form of Mandy Ardron and Kylie Taylor and they smoothed the path for us, for which we were extremely grateful. So despite the stress, a second year happened. And the hard work paid off.

The nativity scene looked splendid under the floodlights. The green in front of the kiln was filled with over a hundred carollers for the community carols. And it was great to see a wide spectrum of ages, a true coming together of a community. The children from Jack's Theatre School sang a carol and later performed a routine in the church. We were also entertained by the newly formed community choir. The

question arose, where do we go from here?

With the help of Ward Councillors Buckley, Carter and Simpson along with the Area Housing Panel we have now raised funds to put in a permanent electricity supply. We hope this will enable us to organise other events through the year. Improvements such as more lighting around the square are being discussed. We are determined not to rest on our laurels.

During the year, following the refurbishment of the hall, we were able to put on other events. We were delighted to be asked to organise the opening of the hall. The parish council invited June McIntosh to do the honours and we provided an afternoon of entertainment. Once again, the church joined us by providing the refreshments. We also hosted a day of local history with the excellent services and knowledge of Brinsworth and Catcliffe History Group who were joined by Tinsley History Group. And Rotherham Heritage Services provided access to the kiln.

We were also delighted to join the school in a couple of projects. The children were full of enthusiasm as they planted bulbs in the churchyard and later in the year they provided an amazing team to carry out a litter pick. We are hoping to repeat these events. We also did our own planting with the team led by Jean Jackson and Sue Fox. The flower displays can only get better in years to come and comments made so far indicate their efforts are much appreciated.

Glenys carried on organising her Beetle Drives. Amy's House and the MS Therapy centre benefitted from our fund-raising efforts and as the evenings are so enjoyable we get a lot from them also. Watch out for the next one.

We can't forget to mention another excellent Christmas Party organised by our human whirlwind Louise Tideswell. The sponsorship she obtained from local businesses was incredible and provided an astounding raffle as well as prizes for the party games. Along with her army of elves she sent the kids home buzzing with excitement although that could have been because they all met Father Christmas and received an early present.

What the new year holds is not certain at present. We really need an input of enthusiastic and preferably younger bodies to carry on our work and provide us with new skills. We can guarantee you a lot of fun and an enormous feeling of satisfaction with a job well done. And real-life friends in the village are more worthwhile than the friends on Facebook we never meet. Dog Fouling Issues

As most residents will be aware; the Parish Council own the recreation field on Poplar Way. There are two football pitches on site; one full size and one junior. The pitches are hired out to four football teams from the area and the rent received from these teams contributes towards the cost of maintaining the pitches and recreation field for the entire community.

There are ongoing issues with some members of the public allowing their dogs to foul on the field and not cleaning up after them; this has been progressively worse over the past few months. It is such a shame; not only for the football teams but other members of the public who are affected by this anti-social behaviour.

If you are a dog owner who uses the recreation field to exercise your dog; please always check that you have bags with you to clear up any mess and leave it in one of the bins located on the grounds; please consider the other users of the field.

Dog fouling is a serious health risk and must be cleaned up to prevent the spread of infection and distress to residents.

Litter and Fly Tipping

Littering and fly tipping is a common problem throughout the borough; both of these actions are classed as environmental crimes that cost Rotherham Metropolitan Borough Council £1.7 million per year. A fixed penalty of £80 can be issued on the spot if you are caught littering or fly tipping which increases to £350 if payment is not made within 14 days. Fly tippers also risk the chance of having their vehicles seized and can also receive fines of up to £50,000 and possibly imprisonment.



There are several hotspots within Catcliffe where there are regular occurrences of fly tipping and littering:

- Land to the rear of High Hazel Crescent.
- Land around the pedestrian footpath from St Mary's Church to Nursery Drive.
- Station Road.
- Gate to Waverley; junction of Orgreave Road and Poplar Way.

Please think about the environment and make use of the public bins located throughout the parish; for larger items; there are four household waste recycling centres within the borough. Plastic Recycling

The recycling of plastic is currently a hot topic throughout the country. More than eight million tonnes of plastic are discarded into the world's oceans each year, this is putting the marine wildlife under serious threat. It is estimated that up to 80% of the plastic was originally lost or discarded on land before washing out to sea. In 2016 researchers found that only 57% of the plastic bottles purchased in the UK were recycled.

Plastic bottle recycling helps to stop all these bottles being dumped into land-fill sites or into the sea and means the plastic they are made from can be used to make new products. A variety of products can be made from recycled plastic bottles; such as clothing; insulation and carpets.

The government are currently discussing introducing a new scheme to boost the recycling of plastic; which involves a deposit return scheme for plastic drinks bottles. Similar schemes have been introduced in Denmark and South Australia and has increased the return rates to 90% and 80% respectively.

Until this scheme is introduced there are facilities to recycle plastic bottles and cartons at all Household Waste Recycling Centre's and at the following locations:

- Asda (Dalton)
- Morrisons (Parkgate and Bramley)
- Forge Island Carpark (Formerly Tesco)



New Community Defibrillator



Catcliffe Parish Council have been very fortunate to receive a grant from the Rotherham Borough Councilor Ward Budget Fund. The grant has enabled the Parish Council to purchase a community defibrillator which has been installed outside the Post Office on Brinsworth Road. The Parish Council would like to thank Mr and Mrs Fieldhouse who are the owners of the Post Office and have volunteered to pay for the electricity supply to the unit.

The defibrillator is fully automated and is stored in a locked heated cabinet and can be accessed by dialling 999. Automatic external defibrillators are easy to use, compact, portable and very effective. They are designed to be used by lay persons; the machines guide the operator through the process by verbal instructions and visual prompts. They are safe and will not allow a shock to be given unless the heart's rhythm requires it.

30,000 of Sudden Cardiac Arrests occur out of a hospital environment every year in the UK which is why having the definitive treatment readily available in public locations is imperative to help increase the chances of survival.



A Different Kind of Christmas Do!



This year at Jack's Theatre School Christmas party as well as the games, cakes and performances there were also 4 members of the school getting their hair cut. No, it wasn't because they had forgotten to have their annual trim! The students and teacher had decided to each get some of their hair cut off to send to the Little Princess Trust Charity.

The Little Princess Charity was set up in order to make real-hair wigs for children who have lost their hair through chemotherapy or for other reasons. The wigs are provided free of charge and are styled for the children in any way they choose, so they can look exactly like their original hair or completely creative and funky. As well as getting their hair cut, there has been a sponsorship collection for the charity through the Just Giving website www.justgiving.com/jackstheatreschoolhaircut.

Teacher, Olivia Egan, said "We have been floored by the response we have had from people, it just seems to be something that touches people's hearts. So far we have smashed our original target of £500 and we hope to make nearly £1000 in the end for the charity. It's really important to provide the money needed to make the wigs, and also to buy afro wigs which they currently cannot make for themselves. Each wig costs between £300 and £500 so it is an expensive business."

In total four students, Bethany Egan, Maisy Oldale, Violet Grady and Manda Hackner and Olivia herself have had a total of 54 inches of hair cut off to send to the charity. As one of the mum's said, it reflects "the true meaning of Christmas and a lovely message for all the children who are taking part".

Jack's Theatre School is a Musical Theatre school for children and adults in Catcliffe. The school has been open for just over two years and aims to provide students with an all-round performance education.

Flood Action Group Report

After quite a few years of feasibility, design and consenting work, the River Rother restoration scheme has been completed.

The work was carried out by Sheffield & Rotherham Wildlife Trust under the guidance of Roy Mosley, Head of Conservation and Land Management.

The scheme involved construction of five berms within the river to encourage a more sinuous flow within the channel with localised scour and deposition, which ultimately should improve the habitat for fish and other wildlife. These berms are constructed from tons of large rocks which have been covered over with soil.

A backwater linked to the channel has also been created as a refuge for water birds, smaller fish and fry.

Roy said, "A considerable amount of flood modelling work has been done to demonstrate the scheme will not increase flood risk (in fact it has a modest flood risk benefit)".

The areas of work on the river banks will soon naturalise to give a more diverse channel both for wildlife and for those of us who enjoy time by the river.

Hate Crimes

Hate crimes and hate incidents can take place anywhere - at home, in the streets, at work, online or at school. Many victims can experience a range of physical and mental effects as a result. Hate in any form should not be tolerated by anyone, no-one should have to live with fear, anxiety and consequences of hate.

The effects of hate crime can last for a long time, especially if you have suffered repeatedly. Many people find it helps to talk to someone who understands. Anyone can be a victim of a hate crime or non-crime hate incident. What is a hate crime? A hate crime is any criminal offence, motivated by prejudice or hostility against a person's:



- Disability - physical, hearing and visual impairments, mental ill health and learning disabilities
- Race - nationality, ethnicity, skin colour and heritage
- Faith - religion, belief, non-religious belief
- Sexual orientation - people who identify as lesbian, gay, bi-sexual or heterosexual
- Gender identity - people who identify as 'trans' including transgender or transsexual people

How do you report Hate Crime to the police?

You can report it direct by calling us on 101.

There is an online reporting facility on the South Yorkshire Police website www.southyorks.police.uk/reportcrime. There is a website called True Vision that you can report directly to if you are not confident in speaking to the police. We also have a series of third party reporting centres throughout the borough who will report crimes/incidents on your behalf. You will find a list of these on our website www.southyorks.police.uk/hatehurts. Hate crime remains a priority for the force and the Police and Crime Commissioner under the area of protecting vulnerable people.

Victim Care is at the front and centre of our investigations here in Rotherham. Parish Boundary Review

Following a petition that was submitted by Orgreave Parish Council which asked to alter the area of the existing Parish of Orgreave, to reduce it so that it would cover only the settlement of Orgreave, and to create a new parish for the area currently within the Waverley South polling district to be named "Waverley". Rotherham Borough Council have now launched a consultation to understand the views of residents in Catcliffe, Waverley and Orgreave. The scope of the review is to consider what the community governance arrangements should be for the Parishes of Catcliffe and Orgreave. This also further seeks to address concerns that were raised by residents about the Orgreave Parish boundary arrangement following the Ward boundary consultation that was concluded last year.

It will consider whether:

- Any changes to the existing arrangements are necessary.
- To alter the area of the existing Parish of Orgreave and create a new Waverley South Parish. Catcliffe Parish to remain as is.
- To create a new Parish covering the whole of Waverley, reducing the current Parish boundaries to cover their respective settlements only.
- To create an unparished area covering the whole of Waverley, reducing the current Parish boundaries to cover their respective settlements only.

The consultation is running until 16th April 2018 and will include three drop in sessions for residents to attend and find out more details. These will be held on:

- 28th February 2pm - 7pm. AMP Technology Centre, Waverley
- 3rd March 11am - 3pm. Orgreave recreation ground
- 17th March 11am - 3pm. Catcliffe Memorial Hall

Following the consultation, a draft and final recommendation will be presented to a full meeting of Rotherham Borough Council with any changes normally come into effect at the next scheduled local elections.

Is important that all residents have the opportunity to give their views and this can be done by visiting www.Rotherham.gov.uk or come along to one of the drop-in sessions mentioned above to find out more.

Student Scholarship Scheme

At the December meeting of 2016 Catcliffe Parish Council made the decision to introduce the Catcliffe Student Scholarship Award, this is a scheme introduced in recognition of the academic achievements of the young people of our Parish. The scheme was made open to students from the Parish area (encompassing Catcliffe and Waverley) who were either attending University/College of Further Education or had received a place for the autumn term; applicants would need to have been resident in the Parish for at least 12 months. The award was to be made in the form of retail vouchers.

The Scheme is running again this year and is open for students either in attendance at University/College now, or for those hoping to go, or with a confirmed place for autumn 2018.

Catcliffe Allotment Association

It's now 8 years since work started on the development of the allotment site and so much has been achieved since those days when nothing was being grown. The first expedition onto the site took place in May 2006 with a mixture of Parish Councillors and a few people who shared an interest in starting allotments. The site had become established with Japanese Knot Weed which caused a delay of a few years before plots could be taken up.

To start with there were two or three members who were regularly fighting against the wilderness of weeds. Soon however; our numbers

began to grow and life became easier and with the formation of the Allotment Association and continued assistance from the Parish Council. The Catcliffe Allotment Association is unusual in that it is responsible for the management of the site with a formal constitution agreed with the Parish Council. In this way it differs from many other sites in the area where the Borough Council has a large say in what is allowed and can be done with the plots. With the Parish Council as the landlord we are a truly community led allotment site and feel privileged to have been able to develop our site very much

as we have wished.

Now we have all the workable plots occupied and have built a community of people with similar interests. The members have worked together; but on a few occasions when people have not abided by the rules we have had the strength; as an association; to deal with these matters.

The produce we grow is amazing; in both the number and variety of crops. We are blessed with the fact that the site is south facing and for most of the year bathed in sunshine from dawn to dusk. The soil varies from plot to plot and each member has

their own method of soil improvement and how the plot is worked. We gain a lot from offering each other advice and exchanging plants to try out. Some members keep birds and these members are also great at sharing their knowledge.

When plots become available we are ready to welcome new members who share our interests. However; our plot holders do tend to be committed for the long haul so it may be necessary for prospective new members to have their name added to a waiting list for a while.
